Let's see what can and what can't be recycled and why!

(AND where you can find the info for your county)



PIZZA BOXES

Answer: No, but...sometimes...

Technically, for Monmouth County, issa no.

Some places do take half of the pizza box if its unsoiled or are equipped to recycle a greasy box. According to a 2020 study it's possible, since most recycling programs are not equipped to handle that, double check your local center.





TIN CANS

Answer: Yes!

But make sure you get most of the food off of your cans before recycling. Doesn't have to be spotless. Remove the lid from the can.

Some centers require labels to be removed.*

*Monmouth Count Recycling allows labels to stay on cans.





STYROFOAM =

Answer: No

(Not with the regular recycling).

BUT there are places you can take your large Styrofoam that recycle them specifically!

For NJ, rigid white styrofoam can be taken to:

BOTTLE CAPS =

Answer: **For Monmouth County, NJ the answer is No** BUT, for some places
the answer is ...SORTA.

Because they're so small caps don't get sorted properly in the recycling process.

To avoid this, **in SOME PLACES**, you can do the following:

- Leave your plastic caps on your bottles when you recycle them
- For metal caps, you can fill a tin can of the same metal with caps until its full. Crimp the can closed and toss the whole can in the recycling.



GLASS BOTTLES

Answer: Yes!

But some glassware like cookware (ie. Pyrex), drinking glasses, window panes etc. have different melting points so they cannot be mixed with regular recycled glass. That ceramic pot that broke goes in the trash.





NEWSPAPERS & CIRCULARS

Answer: Yes!

But be sure your news paper hasn't been contaminated by anything greasy over breakfast or other oily stuff. If your newspaper is wet from the rain, that should be ok. Also remove it from the plastic bag to recycle because....

PLASTIC BAGS

Answer: No

(Not with the regular recycling).

Because plastic bags are so flimsy, they can get caught up in the machinery and stop things from working. Like when a string or something gets caught in your vacuum's spokes.

However!

Some grocery stores and other retailors have programs that recycle plastic bags specifically. Check your local:

ACME
Home Depot
Kohl's
Stop & Shop
Wegmans
Whole Foods

If possible, do not bag other recyclables in plastic bags to toss in the recycle bin.





ALUMINIUM FOIL

Answer: For Monmouth County - No

For some places, maybe!

The big problem with aluminium foil is that most often you use it with food, which as we've mentioned is a no no for recycling.

In some places if you clean your foil well you can put it in the bin.

In other places, you may want to consider other options for clean foil like removing static cling from clothes or using it instead of a scouring pad on dishes.



PAPER TOWELS

Answer: Nope. Just toss this in your garbage (especially if it's contaminated with food/grease).

That may seem obvious, but there's a another reason:

A lot of paper towels have ALREADY been recycled so, their fibers are too short to be woven into something new. Instead, try to reduce your paper towel usage or consider tossing your paper towel into your compost bin.


